



1. Templemore Town Hall: Sir John Carden built the Market House in 1816 using labour and horses supplied by his tenants. It was burned in 1920 and rebuilt in 1927. The new building was opened by the Town Council on 4th April 1927 and has since served as the Town Hall.






3. Sacred Heart Church: The Church was built on a site provided in 1864 by Sir John Carden, formerly the site of an Erasmus Smith School. In 1877 the foundation stone was laid by Archbishop Croke and the Church opened in 1883. The building was refurbished in 1999-2000 as part of the parish's Millennium Project.



4. Tigh Mhuire: Tigh Mhuire was built in 1932 by Duggan Bros. for St. Anne's Guild of the Legion of Mary and the Children of Mary. The building was blessed and officially opened by Canon Denis O'Brien on 25th March 1933.

7. St. Mary's Church: St. Mary's Church was included in Sir John Carden's Town Plan for Templemore in 1770 and was built in 1790. The Church was extended in 1856 and retains many interesting features including stained glass windows dedicated to the memory of members of the Carden family.

5. St. Colmcille's: This building served as the first Catholic Church within the town 1815-1883. It was built with no bell tower because of the Penal Laws. It was the Boys' National School 1883-1968 and named St. Colmcille's when the Christian Brothers



8. The Town Park: The wonderful Town Park is a haven for nature and wildlife. The focal point of the Park is the beautiful lake The park also boasts an extensive area of woodland with a network of trails to explore. Don't miss the ruins of Teampall Mór (site no. 9) and the Black Castle (site no. 10).



9. An Teampall Mór: An Teampall Mór gave Templemore Town its name. This was the medieval Church of the parish of Corkatenny and was a place of worship until 1790.



10. The Black Castle: A castle existed on this site from the 13th century. The present ruin, called The Black Castle, displays features from a later period. In 1698 John Carden leased the castle from Charles Butler. The Carden family lived here until it was accidentally destroyed by fire in 1740.



11. Garda Síochána College: McCan Barracks, originally called "Richmond Barracks", was constructed in 1809 on the 57-acre site donated by Sir John Carden. Richmond Barracks became a prisoner of war camp during WW1, accommodating up to 2300 German soldiers. The building was refurbished in 1964.



12. Templemore Railway Station: Templemore Railway Station was built by the Great Southern and Western Railway Company to serve the market town and military barracks of Templemore. This section of the Dublin-Cork line was opened in March 1848.
